RUTH BREUNINGER DEGABRIELE

Ruth was born on a farm near Frankfort Kansas on June 13th, 1920, to Joanna and Charles Breuninger. She grew up in a family of two sisters, Rose and Winona, and 4 brothers, Raymond, Edward, Eugene and David. She was the fifth child and oldest girl.

Ruth was 17 years old when her family sold the family farm and headed west to Oregon. After graduating from Woodburn High School in 1938, Ruth went to Portland to participate in a New Deal government program offering young women the chance to learn marketable skills, a dormitory in which to live, and help in job placements. She taught volleyball for a few months at a recreation center before being recommended for a position as a live-in nanny and housekeeper for a family with two young girls. At age 20, she moved to Portland, living in the Washington Hotel, and becoming the first woman bellhop of the city. A year later, she moved to Seattle to work at Boeing's Protection Plant Department, fingerprinting for the FBI and processing photo badges for the next 10 years. Occasionally, she was also asked to be a photo model for some Boeing promotional activities.

In Seattle, Ruth found life-long friends at her church, and remained a member for 74 years.

Al entered her life in 1946, when she lived in an apartment above the store he bought with his brother. Al wrote the song "Devoted to You" while courting her. and it was sung at their wedding in 1950. Al and Ruth had a loving marriage of 64 years, enjoying many years of church fellowship, traveling, family reunions, camping, hosting exchange students, wintering in Yuma, and dancing together.

Ruth loved her children, Denise, Dale, Michele and Roberta, and welcomed their spouses, Mark, Janise, Brent, and Brian into the family. She celebrated the arrival of each treasured grandchild; Caitlin, Keith, Gabriel, Kalli, Dallas, and Owen. As well as the matriarch of her own family, she became the aunt that kept the larger DeGabriele and Breuninger families connected, as well.

While raising her kids, she was involved in their scouting organizations and camps, Children's Orthopedic Hospital, and church women's groups. In the mid -1970s, she began 20 years of volunteering for Seattle's Juvenile Court Diversion Program.

For 30 years she was employed as Seattle First United Methodist Church's Wedding Hostess/Food Service Coordinator, coordinating large weekly dinners and over 500 weddings. During the 1970s she also, coordinated food service at Camp Indianola and later served on its Site Council Board.

Ruth enjoyed painting, sewing, upholstering, quilting and rug braiding. Al would always admiringly say, she was good at anything she tried.

As a lover of any type of celebration, she would want us to rejoice in our sweet memories of our lives shared with hers.
